The Connecticut State Seal of Biliteracy was established to recognize public high school graduates who have attained a level of proficiency in English and one or more other languages. On June 6, 2017, the Governor signed the bill into law as Public Act 17-29. Section 1(f) of Public Act 17-29 states, "Not later than September 1, 2017, the State Board of Education shall establish criteria by which a local or regional board of education may affix the Connecticut State Seal of Biliteracy on a diploma awarded to a student who has achieved a high level of proficiency in English and one or more foreign languages. For purposes of this subsection, 'foreign language' means a world language other than English and includes American Sign Language and any other language spoken by a federally recognized Native American tribe." The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) encourages district participation in this initiative. We have 25 seniors taking the assessment. Thank you to Mrs. Montanaro, and Ms. Parsells for coordinating the assessment.

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- The juniors will be taking the SAT assessment in March. We have been preparing students for the SAT. It is important we all encourage our students to do the best they can on test day. The test is not only used for college entrance but for the school standing. We will be planning an event for the students such as a special breakfast for positive participation.

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
